

An industrial event space is transformed into a whimsical wedding scene for an intimate, pretty and fun soirce.

COURTNEY ALLEN AND MATTHEW WEINSTEIN were both living and working in New York (she a grad student at Columbia University and an intern at the United Nations; he a controller at a large hedge fund), but it took a mutual friend's wedding in Washington, D.C., for their paths to cross. When they finally did, it was instant fireworks. "I found out later that he pointed me out at the wedding to a friend of ours and said, 'That's the girl I'm going to marry," Courtney recalls. While the engagement was something Courtney was expecting, the actual proposal was a complete surprise. After a special day together that included yoga, a trip to a museum, dinner and live music, the couple came home to an apartment that Matthew had plastered with pictures of the two of them together. On the back of each picture was a note. The final note read, "I have just one thing to ask," and she looked up to see Matthew holding the ring, a simple but sparkling diamond eternity band that would set the stage for the wedding ahead-a simple yet elegant affair.

The couple enlisted wedding planner Jesse Deckard to help them carry out their vision of an urban yet rustic event. The recently opened Morgan Manufacturing was their venue, a large industrial space with one area that Deckard set up to look like an intimate chapel, while another, he outfitted with long communal harvest tables. Mango and teal accents were mixed in with tones of blush and cream, and the tables were draped with gold sequin runners and loaded with tea candles and garden blooms. Cafe lights contributed to the overall

glow and romance in the space. With the perfect light of a fall sunset streaming through the warehouse windows and illuminating Courtney's transparent train, the couple said "I do" to breathtaking effect. A seasonal menu by Food for Thought followed, along with dancing late into the night. The evening was by all accounts magical and the perfect note to kick off a lifetime of happiness.





Day-of coordinator Nicki Eisenstein of BCR Events describes the reception as "very lush and beautiful." Instead of a fall color scheme for their October nuptials, they added a springtime lightheartedness with centerpieces of roses in assorted ivory, peach and blush hues, and lots of candles.

The couple's first dance, to a modern take on Elvis' "Can't Help Falling in Love," kicked off the fun. "We danced together all night with all our friends around us," Ashley says. Souvenir "Ashley and Greg" sunglasses upped the celebratory mood, which carried on to an afterparty in the hotel's art deco-style bar, Deca—a perfect reflection of the evening's classic yet modern union.


